Providing religious support to soldiers at CP Oscar

Duty is one of the Army Values, but some soldier's duty includes answering to the highest authority. The Chaplain is the official link between service to the country and service to one's faith. IG Office is CDR's eyes, ears

"Our goal is to make sure the standards are being met for these soldiers," said Wojcik. "We also want to make sure soldiers are doing the jobs

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The spirit of "Hwarang"

It's August, and warriors have amassed to show their combat readiness in this year's Ulchi Focus Lens exercise.

UFL is a routine, regularly scheduled summer exercise involving forces from both the Republic of Korea and the United States. It is designed to evaluate and improve combined and joint coordination, procedures, plans and systems necessary for the conduct of contingency operation of R.O.K and U.S. Forces.

Fifteen centuries ago, when this part of Korea was known as the Kingdom of Shilla, a group of Shilla warriors called the "Hwarang" demonstrated their battle skills and their nobility in this same area. The Hwarang was a youth organization led by a single "Kook sun," the spiritual leader. Under this leader, the Hwarangs led thousands of "Nangdo", to become a Hwarang. These young, aspiring warriors trained in martial arts and in academics, aspiring to become a Hwarang. A knightly code of conduct resulted from Hwarang-do training, and the Hwarang engaged in both military and spiritual exercises to cleanse and train their minds and bodies.

It is in the spirit of Hwarang that this newsletter was created to honor the servicemembers and events of this year's UFL exercise that demonstrate the spirit of Hwarang.

If you are tired of eating at the Camp Walker mess hall, you may want to sample some of the restaurants within its confines. Most offer quick meals at an affordable price.

Burger King, located up the street from the PX, is open from 7 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. You can even call out for delivery; the number is 764-4876.

At the PX, you can savor the tastes of Taco Bell and Robin Hood Sandwich Shop. Hint: If friends accompany you to Taco Bell, you all should consider bringing your gas masks. And, do as I would do, add some hot sauce to kick your taco up a notch.

The Evergreen is open from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. and serves breakfast, lunch, and

dinner. There are various menu items for each meal; breakfast averages about \$5, lunch will cost you around \$6-7, and dinner about \$10-12. You can phone for daily specials by calling 764-4846.

Next door to The Evergreen is the golf course, which operates a snack bar from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. A meal will generally cost you \$5-6. The snack bar welcomes all patrons, so stop by even if you do not wish to golf.

If pizza is on your mind, call Anthony's at 764-4650 between 3-8 p.m. for delivery.

Of course, you can always stop by the Camp Walker commissary for a variety of foods. Or, call them at 764-5044 for takeout sandwiches.

These establishments offer a different variety than the fine cafeteria food you enjoy at the mess hall. Do keep in mind that the mess hall offers MREs for soldiers on the go and is always willing to take suggestions for meals.
